Student talks about his work experience at Essex Media Workshop

"In February I went to Essex Media Workshop (EMW) as part of the work experience scheme that the school sets for Year 10 students every year. Essex Media Workshop is based in Basildon just off the A127 and the workshop is on the Parklands Estate. The company produce lots of films for organisations including primary schools and the Basildon Foster Carers.

Over the two week period I was there, I learnt about the basics of media and how a production firm works. At my time at the workshop I worked in the edit suites where I produced my own video for a place called Lake Como in Italy. I added effects such as movement, music and titles to the shots that I edited. I also went off site to shoot my own film.

At school I'm taking Media Studies, and having this placement gave me a better insight to the media industry and the type of job that I want to do when I leave school. It was a very useful experience and I enjoyed my time there."

Dance theatre visit



Student interviews professional footballer

Thomas, a Year 9 student, recently had the opportunity to interview Paul Benson, a professional football player from Swindon Town, currently on loan to Cheltenham Town.



Thomas: Which team have you always wanted to play for?

Paul: Being born in Southend I've always wanted to play for Southend United, I played in the youth team when I was growing up but never got to play for the first team.

Thomas: Who was your idol growing up and why?

Paul: Growing up I admired the players that played in my position (striker) so players like Alan Shearer, Ian Wright and Gary Lineker were my favourites, I also used to like Paul Gascoigne.

Thomas: What team did you support growing up?

Paul: I supported Southend United when I was growing up, I used to have a season ticket and never used to miss a home game.

Thomas: What player would you most like to play alongside and why?

Paul: I'd love to play alongside David Beckham, I think with his crossing ability I'd get lots of chances to score goals! He's also a great role model and I admire how well he's done in his career.

Thomas: Who's the best centre back you've played against and why?

Paul: The best centre back I've played against is probably Michael Dawson. He was very strong, had good pace, and was good in the air, everything that makes a good defender. I'm not surprised he's in the England squad.

Thomas: Who do you think is the greatest manager and why?

Paul: The greatest manager in my opinion, certainly from my era, is Sir Alex Ferguson. He has achieved everything a manager can achieve and keeps producing great teams. He has built about five or six different sides in his time at United and every one has achieved success. There have been great managers in the past like Bill Shankly, Matt Busby, Brian Clough and I think future managers like Jose Mourinho and Pep Guardiola will have great careers, but I don't think anyone will win as many trophies as Ferguson has for a very long time, if ever.

Thomas: What's the best football stadium you've played at?

Paul: Wembley is definitely the best stadium I've played at, I've been very lucky to have played there twice. It is arguably the best football ground in the world and to have played, and scored there, makes me feel very proud.

Thomas: Who would you say is the most skilled player that you have played with?

Paul: The most skilled player I have played with is Matt Ritchie. Matt has recently won the League One 'Player of the Year' and is still very young. He has played in the Premier League already when he was at Portsmouth and even though he is in League One now I think in a few years time he will be back in the Premier League playing every week. Paolo Di Canio was also very, very skilful when he used to join in with us at training and I could tell how good he must have been when he used to play.

Thomas: Which of your team mates spends the longest in front of the mirror?

Paul: At Swindon lots of the players spend ages in front of the mirror, and it's probably Matt Ritchie again who spends the longest! He moisturises all the time and then spends ages doing his hair, he probably spends thirty minutes every day after training in front of the mirror!

Thomas: Who's the biggest practical joker on the team?
